

A Message from **Our Executive Director**



The new federal administration has brought dramatic change to Washington, DC and grave concerns that decades of bipartisan progress towards environmental protection will be reversed. With this backdrop, our work to protect clean water and healthy ecosystems has never been more urgent.

Climate change is intensifying extreme weather, increasing flooding, droughts, and storms that impact our communities. The new administration's deletion of language about climate change from websites across the federal government and threats to fire more than 1,000 EPA employees doesn't change these facts.

The Watershed Institute is proud to have helped spearhead bipartisan efforts in New Jersey to address water pollution and flooding. Our goal is to move beyond merely slowing environmental decline and work to restore our degraded streams, rivers, and watersheds.

New Jersey voters have consistently voiced their demand for strong water protection. It is time to redouble our commitment to clean water as a right for all, not a privilege for a few. The Watershed Institute stands firm in calling for bipartisan support for robust, science-based environmental safeguards, community engagement, and strong advocacy to ensure lasting protections. Thank you for your unwavering support.

Growing threats, from unchecked development and harmful algal blooms to PFAS contamination, put public health and wildlife at risk. Municipalities need stronger support to implement effective protections and, together, we must take decisive action to safeguard our water resources.

WHY SHOULD
WE CARE ABOUT
GLACIERS?

Glaciers are a critical component of the Earth's water cycle, and their health directly impacts water availability, weather systems, and ecosystems worldwide.

- Accelerated glacier melting due to climate change disrupts the natural balance of the water cycle, leading to:
 - Sea level rise and inundation of low-lying areas.
 - Increased flooding during excessive melt periods.
 - Reduced freshwater availability as glaciers shrink.
 - Long-term changes in precipitation and drought patterns.
- Glaciers stabilize local and global temperatures, influencing evaporation rates and cloud formation.
- As glaciers shrink, exposed darker surfaces (like rocks) absorb more heat, increasing local evaporation and altering weather patterns.

For decades, this unique organization has served as a resource for students and environmentalists. Each visitor to our Watershed Center and Reserve and each participant in our many programs around central New Jersey brings their own perspective, and The Watershed Institute meets them with a diverse range of activities and opportunities.

For nature enthusiasts, The Watershed Institute is a trailblazer—literally. With 10 miles of well-maintained trails winding through lush forests, serene meadows, and tranquil streams, it's a sanctuary for hikers. Whether you're a seasoned adventurer, a nature enthusiast, or a family looking for a leisurely walk, the beauty of the surroundings in every season ensures every step is a moment to savor. If you are lucky, you might even have a chance encounter with a mink, a great blue

heron, or the threatened red-shouldered hawk.

A CLASSROOM WITHOUT WALLS

Education is at the heart of The Watershed Institute's mission. We offer classes and workshops that bring science, sustainability, and the natural world to life. From

interactive field trips for school groups to adult workshops on conservation and environmental stewardship, The Watershed Institute inspires a lifelong love of learning.

In 2024, 3,824 school-aged students participated in **Watershed Institute education** programs.

221 teachers attended Watershed training last year.

where kids can climb, balance, and leap like tree frogs in a beautiful outdoor setting. This engaging space invites children to connect with nature through active play and imagination.

Each summer, children at The Watershed Institute's Nature Camp dive into outdoor adventures that foster a love for nature and create lifelong memories. Surrounded by beautiful trails, streams, and wildlife, campers engage in hands-on activities while building friendships and discovering the wonders of the natural world.

For volunteers and donors, The Watershed Institute is a community. From reserve stewardship to welcoming visitors, stream cleanups to stream testing, and wildlife

More than 800 volunteers serve the Watershed year-round.

About 600 volunteers participate in stream clean-ups.

A BUTTERFLY SANCTUARY

Families, nature enthusiasts, and photographers stroll through the outdoor enclosure, watching butterflies gracefully dance from flower to flower. Children excitedly observe caterpillars munching on leaves, while gardeners take inspiration from the lush habitat, learning how to support pollinators in their own yards.

We offer expertise and support for environmental professionals, municipal officials, environmental lawyers,



architects, and advocates through technical training, webinars, and the NJ Watershed Conference, which continues to expand its reach and impact each year. Professionals and environmental advocates look to us for up-to-date information and advice related to legislation, policies, and practices.

300 people attended the NJ Watershed Conference in 2024.

6 technical webinars were offered and 130 CEUs were awarded last year.

Our River-Friendly Certification Program empowers residents, businesses, and schools to take action


